THE NATIONAL HICKORY CHAMPIONSHIP

was established in 1998 to bring together golfers who enjoy playing golf in historic conditions, the way it was played before the turn of the century. Playing according to 19th century rules and using authentic 19th century equipment makes the NHC the sternest test of hickory golf contested anywhere. Open to all, the NHC draws the most ardent and accomplished wood shaft golfers from across America and Canada. Competitive, yet fun, it is America's hickory championship—the ultimate test of hickory golf.

he 2015 National Hickory Championship will be conducted over historic Oakhurst Links, first used in the early 1880s. Contestants in the Championship play 36 holes in two days. Clubs must be original 19th century or approved replicas (available for rent if you don't have your own set) and all players use the same modern-made, low-compression gutta percha-type balls supplied by the Championship. Tee shots are struck from sand tees. No golf bags are allowed so players carry clubs under their arm in the manner of the 1880s. There is a simple dress code. Although period costumes are not required, many golfers dress appropriately and prizes are presented to the "best dressed." The NHC is like no other hickory golf tournament here, in Britain or anywhere else in the world; it is authentic, competitive, historic, truly unique and, above all, fun!

Foursomes Madness

The 2015 edition of the Elmore Just Foursomes Competition will feature several changes to the way the flites will be arranged. Play will be the same: some of the divisions observe match play rules and scoring, other divisions will follow stroke play rules and scoring, which is what we have done in the past. The most important change is that teams in all flites except Clan will now be arranged completely randomly. Like the Match 8 division, we will draw for partners on the first tee. Pretty cool, eh? When the pairing sheet is mailed in May you will see your name in the flite in which you will be playing. You just won't know who your playing partner is until minutes before teeing off. The second change is that there will be a special "Smackdown" challenge flite, by request of certain contestants who are arranging a private challenge match. By decree of the Czar this has been legitimatized. Perhaps in future NHCs other groups of players will apply for their own grudge matches.
